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## Christ Lutheran Church

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Even before a single voter went to the polls today, more than 2/3 the number of votes cast in 2016 had already been cast by mail-in or absentee balloting or early voting. Even so, it has been predicted that we may not know the outcome for days. In an election season that has already been nerve-wracking, sometimes cast in apocalyptic terms, the prospect of a delay adds more anxiety to the mix.

The Church, however, knows something about an apocalypse! No, not the day or season, but only that whatever suffering we may endure, God will ultimately reign with justice and mercy. Our assurance lies in that hope, and our responsibility remains to live and act in faith in the meantime.



For CLC, that means a prayer vigil that began early this morning, as polls officially opened at 7:00am, and will continue into early tomorrow morning. A sign-up sheet went out yesterday for folks to offer non-partisan prayers for our nation in half-hour or one-hour blocks. (Suggestions for how to pray for those time periods, long for most Lutherans (!), accompanied the sign-up.

Whether or not you claim a block in the schedule, do pray for God's will to be done, and for true healing of the deep divides in our country.

#### Music Notes Tom Berryman, Music Director

Our singers and players at Christ Lutheran regularly record hymns, instrumental and choral music for our ZOOM services and other events online: a wonderful and generous offering This past Sunday, for All Saints Day, we created a virtual congregation, singing the quintessential All Saints hymn, *For All the Saints.* Using my recording of the CLC organ with a "click track", six singers listened with headphones and recorded their parts, mostly at home. I then aligned each of their vocal recordings with the organ track, balanced the volume, adjusted the phrasing and tone and added presence.



Here's a glimpse of three of the voices that were included this past week for the opening hymn. Notice how distinctive each track seems: some have more percussive vowels, some have a more continuous tone, some are a bit louder. All are reasonably well aligned with each other.

The second illustration shows the final, combined recording that you heard on Sunday. The organ is combined with all six singers. Notice that the wave forms are much larger (louder). The "clatter" of our organ's mechanicals adds to the regular percussive vowel spikes.



The resulting recording barely approaches the joy and thrill of singing together, but it does serve as a reminder, pale as it is, that we are still singing God's praises, if remotely.
