

If you tune into "Sing For Joy" (see below for the regular reference to this outstanding weekly offering) from St. Olaf College this week, you will hear spoken and musical reflections on the readings appointed for this past Sunday, November 8. We are at the end of the Pentecost season and in the church year, with plenty about the "last things."

At the top of this week's play list, is the "Dies Irae" ("Day of Wrath") from Benjamin Britten's WAR REQUIEM (1961), drawing on the Roman Catholic requiem mass texts with interpollations of poetry by



Wilfrid Owen. Britten offers a spirit of reconciliation in this work written for the consecration of the Coventry Cathedral, whose 14th century predecessor was destroyed in a bombing raid during World War II. For the 1963 recording, conducted by Britten, soloists from Britain, Russia and Germany

were featured on a release that sold over 200,000 copies within the first few months.

This is a brilliant work, well worth hearing.

Sculpting Faith: A Conversation with Christian Sculptor, Tim Schmalz November 12, 2020 7 PM - 8 PM EST Via Zoom

Join Christian sculptor Tim Schmalz and A Faith That Does Justice Founder Father Peter Gyves, SJ, MD for a conversation about how Christian art can reflect today's global world and serve as a form of prayer in action. They will discuss the Schmalz sculptures, which reflect social injustices related to homelessness, racial justice, and oppression. You will discover how you can apply to your own lives what Schmalz has learned about faith in action through sculpting.

The Schmalz sculpture, Angels Unawares, was inspired by the biblical admonition "Do not neglect hospitality, for through it some have unknowingly entertained angels (Heb 13:2)." The sculpture was unveiled in St. Peter's Square on World Day of Migrants and Refugees in 2019. Hear from the artist about that experience. Register for free here.






