A poem by John Greenleaf Whittier (1873) serves as the text for contemporary composer Paul Halley's composition "Sound over all waters" written in 1982 to commemorate the appearance of Coretta Scott King in a service at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City. Gail Weston-Roberts will be singing this work as the Postlude on **Sunday, January 17th** as we remember the life and work of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. and celebrate the inauguration of a new President of the United States on January 20th.

1 Sound over all waters, reach out from all lands, The chorus of voices, the clasping of hands; Sing hymns that were sung by the stars of the morn, Sing songs of the angels when Jesus was born.

2 Blow, bugles of battle, the marches of peace; East, west, north, and south, let the strong quarrel cease; O sing ye the song that the angels began, Sing glory to God, and of goodwill unto man!

3 With glad jubilations, bring hope to the nations, The dark night is ending, and dawn has begun; Rise, hope of the ages, arise like the sun; All speech flow to music, all hearts beat as one!
