
Amen.

Epiphany is a season of light in the church year, coming at just the right time when the days are lengthening and darkness is receding. Epiphany hymns often include references to stars, light, brightness and hope: "How brightly shines the morning star," "What star is this," "This little light of mine," and for this coming Sunday, "We are marching in the light of God" or "Siyahamba." "Siyhamba" is one of numbers of South African freedom songs that became especially well known in the 1960's following the horrible Sharpesville massacre in 1960. Swedish musician Anders Nyberg collected and transcribed many of these songs under the auspices of the Church of Sweden Mission and the Lutheran World Federation. "Siyahamba" is surely one of the most frequently included of these songs in North American hymnals and will be our Hymn of the Day this Sunday, January 24.


Adult Formation
