

Family News

God's timing doesn't always jibe with ours! Early Thursday morning, several weeks ahead of when we thought we'd be as ready as we could be, Comlanvi (dad, aka Germaine), Zourfahou (mom, aka Nadia), and their three-year-old and eight-month-old (adorable) little boys, arrived at Logan Airport.

While Pamela Bathen, Dorothy Nail, and Rolf Larson have been on the hunt for long-term housing, the family has been comfortably decompressing from a very long and arduous journey at the Framingham Residence Inn. We're grateful to a couple of folks, including Sandy Smith, who have contributed Marriott points to minimize the cost.

In these early days, the focus has been on insuring compliance with immigration requirements, food, health, and housing, but English Language Learning (ELL) will begin soon. (Both parents are fluent in French, the official language of Togo, Ewe, their tribal language, and Portuguese. Comlanvi is quite capable of communicating in English, and Zourfahou will not be far behind.)

A number of people from our congregation have already made generous contributions toward the monetary commitment of accompaniment, approximately \$50,000 for each of the first two years, of which CLC has pledged half. If you would like to make a contribution, there are several options:

You may make a one-time or annual gift; You may make a monthly pledge; You may commit to covering a certain expense, for example, cell phone service for a period of time, or providing a pre-loaded Charlie Card, or a gift card for a grocery store, or Kohl's or Target, or Amazon, etc.

Comlanvi and Zourfahou have expressed their gratitude over and over again, and often offer a benediction, "God bless you." God has indeed blessed us in this remarkable family.
