Comlanvi, Zourfahou, and their sons Hosni (age three) and Haris (age 8 months) have experienced a heartfelt welcome, thanks to so many! Dinners, coordinated each night by Cathy Gallagher, arrive each evening between 5:30 and 6:00. The boys may well be the best-dressed little ones in Natick, with an abundance of new and gently-used clothes gathered by Gretchen Rowley. Comlanvi and Zourfahou, both already multi-lingual, will quickly gain greater English proficiency with English Language Learning (ELL) coordinated by partners from the Unitarian Universalist Area Congregation of Sherborn and Peace Lutheran Church in Wayland.

The legal process toward asylum statutes is underway, thanks to connections with Brandeis University's The Right to Immigrate Institute (TRII) made by Martha Cronin and Ascentria Care Alliance through Jeff Kinney. A visit with Pr. Miriam Szedro (Resurrection Lutheran Church, Roxbury), a native of Ghana whose father is Togolese and a trip to a Caribbean market with familiar foods helped the family feel at home. Soon, we hope, the family will be moving into a more permanent home, as Pamela Bathen lends her real estate expertise and Dorothy Nail coordinates furnishings. (As with the boys' clothing, the outpouring has been tremendous. Thank you!) A Steering Committee with representation from five of the coalition congregation has formed, and each will shortly assume leadership for different aspects of the family's journey toward self-sufficiency. Coming soon are a training resource for those who will interact with the family, and Sign Up Genius with opportunities to assist with various tasks and items to be collected.

Spinning all of the plates has been Rolf Larson, without whose passion, commitment, and dogged pursuit of understanding and problem-solving we could not undertake this ministry of accompaniment.

Local author Jennifer DeLeon will join us via Zoom to discuss her Young Adult novel, *Don't Ask Me Where I'm From.* Goodreads' description: "First-generation American LatinX Liliana Cruz does what it takes to fit in at her new nearly all-white school. But when family secrets spill out and racism at school ramps up, she must decide what she believes in and take a stand." Set in the fictionalized community of "Westburg", the novel describes the experiences of Liliana who is half-Guatemalan, half-Salvadoran as she participates in METCO, the actual Boston program that buses students from the city to the affluent suburbs of the Metrowest.

The novel is a timely read in this current era of racial consciousness as we learn the complex effects of racism in our culture.
