

Music Notes Tom Berryman, Music Director

Music for May 16, the Seventh (and final) Sunday of Easterfeatures organ music by the eminent British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams and quintessential American composer Scott Joplin. The Vaughan Williams setting of the Welsh hymntune "Rhosymedre" ("Lovely") serves as the Prelude. Listen to Vaughan Williams string orchestra transcription of Rhosymedre.

Concert organist, E. Power Biggs transcribed Scott Joplins "The Cascades" rag in the 1970's for a lively set of recordings he made using a pedal harpsichord built for him by John Challis. I'll play the Biggs transcription on the Christ Lutheran Johnson Organ for the Postlude on Sunday.

Local author Jennifer DeLeon will join us via Zoom to discuss her Young Adult novel, *Don't Ask Me Where I'm From.* Goodreads' description: "First-generation American LatinX Liliana Cruz does what it takes to fit in at her new nearly all-white school. But when family secrets spill out and racism at school ramps up, she must decide what she believes in and take a stand." Set in the fictionalized community of "Westburg", the novel describes the experiences of Liliana who is half-Guatemalan, half-Salvadoran as she participates in METCO, the actual Boston program that buses students from the city to the affluent suburbs of the Metrowest.

The novel is a timely read in this current era of racial consciousness as we learn the complex effects of racism in our culture.

Call to Action

The call to love and serve our neighbor is the partner of loving a nd serving God. Sometimes that means lending a helping hand to meet an immediate need: food donations to the Natick Service Council or responding to a GoFundMe plea. The next step is to empower people to stand on their own-"a hand up rather than a handout"-as we do with Family Promise or the accompaniment of the family from Togo.

The next step is usually the hardest: working at the policy level to correct injustices that create or maintain inequities. **The ELCA Advocacy Office** offers thoughtful guidance to us as we navigate such issues.
