

Nearly fifteen months to the day since we last celebrated Holy Communion at Christ Lutheran Church, the outdoor jazz service on Sunday, June 13 at 7:00 p.m. will be a Eucharist! We'll assemble on the lawn outside the "new" wing, where Ross Petot, piano, John Clark, clarinet and saxophone, and Peter Tillotson, Bass, will once again lead the evening's music. Those participating will receive Communion in one kind, that is, the bread (Communion wafer) alone.

In the event of poor weather, the service will move inside. There being no more restrictions on gathering for worship, registration is not required. Anyone who is not vaccinated is encouraged to mask and socially distance for their own wellbeing, and anyone who chooses is likewise welcome to mask and distance. *If you would like to receive Communion but cannot participate on the 13<sup>th</sup>, please contact Pr. Bourret Our next in-person service of Holy Communion will be July 11.* 

This Sunday morning we will be experimenting with "hybrid" worship, with parts of the service broadcast from the nave, and most parts remaining remote. Please bear with us as we encounter any glitches! We expect that hybrid will be the way forward, even as we begin to shift to largely in-person worship.

Plan to remain after worship for our spring semi-annual congregational meeting when we receive reports, elect Council members, Endowment Committee members, and voting members to the New England Synod Assembly. Watch for the reports in your inbox. Our thanks to all who offer themselves in leadership.


December and have made numbers of recordings for our online services and Reflections.

The adult forum is on hiatus until September. Please submit your ideas for topics to be taken up when we resume to Pr. Bourret.




From the New England Synod: Water for Life Seminar - Thursday, June 3 at 7 p.m.

## Call to Action

Virginia Theological Seminary (the premiere divinity school of the Episcopal Church in the USA) has become one of the first such institutions to begin offering reparations to descendants of enslaved and underpaid Black people who built and worked at the seminary for decades. Is it time for the US to take such measures?

The House of Representatives is expected to vote on HR40, the Commission to Study and Develop Reparations Proposals for African Americans Act. Many of us at CLC have been engaged in pursuing anti-racism education, and the matter of reparations has entered into that conversation. Have you adopted a habit of walking during the pandemic? Are you looking for a reason to walk? Calumet is launching an alternative to its annual "Reach the Beach" runners' fundraiser, "Walk the Walk," for us mortals who take things a bit more slowly.

Here's the skinny: congregational teams commit to walking, whether a lot or very little, so it doesn't matter whether you're up for 10 miles a day or two miles a week; it's \$25 per person to register, and one team leader from each congregation keeps track of the total team miles; folks are welcome to add on a one-day appeal to support the cause, and it all helps send kids to camp.
