**Bringing the Pandemic to Prayer:** This Sunday, the Natick Interfaith Clergy Association invites us to join with our neighbors of all faith to give thanks for essential workers, scientists, teachers, and medical personnel; to grieve the deaths of loved ones, members of our communities, and children of God around the world; to lament the inequities exposed and worsened, and the pain of lost opportunities and lost employment; and, finally, to turn to hope for renewed health, strengthened bonds, and a more just society.

The service will be **Sunday afternoon**, **22 August**, **at 3:30 pm** on the grounds of **Fisk Memorial United Methodist Church**, **106 Walnut Street** in Natick (rain date: Sunday 29 August). You are invited to **bring your own lawn chair** and encouraged to **wear a mask**. You are also asked to **bring a fist-sized stone** which will be used in a communal ritual of remembrance for all those who have died or been hurt by COVID - 19 and for all those still struggling with the disease or still grieving the loss of someone beloved. CLC's Bell Choir will offer the opening and closing music.

Whether the reopening our building is long-term or turns out to be temporary, we were able to offer space last week to a group of STEM teachers for training in offering enrichment for their students. Every group that makes use of space at CLC is a



reminder that our resources are God's resources, entrusted to us to further the reign of God in the world.


### **Adult Formation**

With the release of the United Nations report last week on global warming there could not be a more timely read than *The Overstory* by Richard Powers. A sobering, sweeping novel that tells the stories of nine main characters and their encounters with trees--lots of trees--*The Overstory* engages the reader in the complex, emerging understanding of the interconnectedness of trees and our human connectedness with them. Building on the revelations of Peter Wohleben's *The Hidden Life of Trees*, this

gripping novel draws on Powers' rich imagination to tell a story that involves us all.

The island nation of Haiti has suffered a severe earthquake, killing over 1300 people, injuring many more, toppling buildings, and exacerbating already difficult living conditions. You will remember that the

nation, the poorest in the western hemisphere, saw its president, Jovenel Moise, assassinated just over a month ago.
