Last week, Associate to Bishop James Hazelwood, Pastor Sara Anderson, met with our Congregation Council to provide an overview of the transition after Pastor Bourret's retirement and the process of calling a new pastor for Christ Lutheran Church.

Bp. Hazelwood and his staff have devised a somewhat new approach, both owing to the clergy shortage and also finding that the process has improved the "fit" of new pastors and congregations. CLC will appoint a "Transition Team" of six to eight members to plan and execute a number of events designed to produce a clear picture of where CLC is, the church's gifts and strengths and challenges, as well as its particular character or energy. A pastor serving in a nearby congregation, trained for this work, will coach the team through this process.

Another pastor—or perhaps multiple pastors—will provide worship leadership, pastoral care, and attend meetings of the Congregation Council during the interim. Additional duties, such as attending committee meetings and administrative oversight might be assigned as well, as negotiated.

Once the congregational profile is written, a Call Committee of six members, representing the diversity of CLC, will be appointed by the Council (per our Constitution), to interview the candidate recommended by the Office of the Bishop. The Council will work with a recommended candidate to work out compensation and other logistical matters, and, finally, the entire congregation will have the opportunity to meet the candidate at a "meet and greet" before a vote to call.

This is a good time to remind everyone that, following her retirement at the end of November, Pastor Bourret will not be available for pastoral acts (weddings, funerals, baptisms), nor will matters related to CLC be topics of conversation. These are precious times for pastoral relationships with a new shepherd to be forged. Friendships, however, may be maintained.

With the return of the CLC Choir to singing live and in person for our Sunday services, we have been able to provide greater variety in psalm singing than during our COVID days. Typically, a cantor alternates verses with the congregation using a formulaic tone, with all joining together for a refrain. Sometimes we sing an appropriate hymn paraphrase of a psalm. This Fall we



have been able to use psalm settings from the *Ionian Psalter*. Composed by Peter Hallock (1924-2014) for St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle, the *Ionian Psalter* psalms have the congregation and choir sing an antiphon. The psalm verses are sung in four part harmony by the choir alone. This Sunday, October 10 we will be using Hallock's setting of Psalm 90: 12-17. Listen and watch the choir of the *Lutheran Church of Honolulu sing Psalm 23 from Hallock's Ionian Psalter*.
