At Christ Lutheran, we are so pleased to offer use of our building, not as bedrooms this time but as meeting space for FPM staff. Tuesdays and Wednesdays, starting in mid-January, Family Promise will have full access to the All Saints room for staff meetings, small groups consultations, and as a simple place to gather while they, too, are in transition.

Looking Ahead

Sunday, January 9, immediately following 10 a.m. worship. In-person attendance required. The boiler in the parsonage needs replacement prior to rental. The estimated cost in the \$15,000 range requires the consent of the congregation. The approval of the expenditure is the only agenda item.

Semi-annual Meeting I – Sunday, January [30?], **2022, following 10 a.m. Voting members in-person attendance required.** Financial reports of fiscal year 2021 and the proposed budget for 2022 are the principal components of this congregational meeting. Voting members will also elect two delegates to the June New England Synod assembly. The Council president will name the members of the nominating committee for Semi-annual Meeting II elections in the spring.

Call to Action

On December 30, the Marshall Fire ignited in Boulder County, Colorado. Over 6,200 acres burned quickly, forcing the evacuations of 35,000 people and destroying hundreds of homes. **Lutheran Disaster Response** is engaging with the Rocky Mountain Synod and Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains to respond to the impact of the fires. They anticipate that immediate needs will include emotional and spiritual care, temporary shelters, food and other necessities. With local partners, Lutheran Disaster Response will continue to accompany survivors throughout the years of long-term recovery. Your gifts will support wildfire survivors.
