Pastor's Letter for May Newsletter

May is my last month as your interim pastor. In June, Pastor Amanda comes on board for the next stage of your journey.



Having the summer to get settled in, meet more people, and start planning, works out well for both her and you. I'm excited for you all and wish you shalom!

Probably the most important thing about my time here is my time here. When Amy sent out a request for someone to cover a few months, I planned to be done by June 2019. So much for that idea! The Session and I had to rework the agreement, I had to do some fancy talking at my regular job, the PNC took a few steps forward and a few steps backward, and all of you hung in there. Having a plan is great, having some agility and resilience when the plan changes is even better.

Our time together confronted me with the fact that I'm not as resilient nor agile as I thought. I prefer predictability and stability. Much of the leadership snake oil peddled around focuses on developing a vision, having a direction, and being decisive. Good stuff for sure, but secondary to a critical part of what makes church different from any other organization. "Love one another as I have loved you" is how our real boss put it. Genuine, palpable love must condition both our plans and our execution.

Several times during the 6 months that turned into 18 months, I found myself frustrated that things were taking twists and turns. God would gently remind me: "Carl, step 1 is love these people and live so they know it. Step 2 is if things don't work out the way you plan, go back to step 1." As to why the interim lasted 18 months, it wasn't my fault nor the PNC's, nor was it really any of the candidates who almost said yes. The flooded choir room, COVID-19, and all kinds of other things aren't anyone's fault. Through those times we first need to love one another and then figure out the next steps.

Sometimes it is our fault. There are things I said from the pulpit or in meetings or in conversation that I wish I could take back. I'm trying to reduce those instances, but they still happen. Forgiveness is one of the most powerful tools in love's tool kit. You were realistic in recognizing mistakes as mistakes, but did not hold them against me and part ways. You extended forgiveness, rarely using those words but instead demonstrating it in deed by continuing to worship, to greet me personally, to ask for prayer, to comment on a sermon that hit you a certain way. You lived Step 1 and step 2!

My biggest prayer is that love will mark your time with Pastor Amanda as it marked my time with you. Thank you for the privilege!

When to wear a mask—from The Minnesota Department of Health

The federal government has issued some new guidance on the <u>use of cloth face coverings to help</u> <u>slow the spread of COVID-19</u>. CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies).

- Here are a few important things to keep in mind:
- Masks or cloth face coverings can help with preventing **your** germs from infecting others especially in situations where you may spread the virus without symptoms.
- Wearing a mask **does not** protect you from others who may spread the virus. So, whether or not you wear a mask, you still need to wash your hands frequently, cover your cough, and practice social distancing by keeping at least 6 feet of space between people.
- People who are sick should still stay home. Wearing a mask does not mean people who are sick should go out into the community. If you are sick and need to go to the doctor, call your health care provider before going in and wear a mask to the clinic.
- **Don't buy or wear surgical or N95 masks.** These supplies are in high need in health care facilities to protect health care workers.
- Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY


We celebrate Mother's Day in May. It made me think of my Mother, who passed a year ago, which got me thinking about some of the famous mothers in the Bible. There are many, but a few stuck out the most as playing key roles in the coming of Jesus Christ. (From an article by Jack Zavada.) "None of them was perfect, yet each showed strong faith in God. God, in turn, rewarded them for their confidence in him."


Eve – "was the first woman and the first mother. Without a single role model or mentor, she paved the maternal way to become 'Mother of All the Living.' Despite many tragedies, Eve went on to fulfill her part in God's plan of populating the Earth."

Jochebed – "the mother of Moses, is one of the underappreciated mothers in the Bible, yet she also showed tremendous faith in God. To avoid the mass slaughter of Hebrew boys, she set her baby adrift in a basket on the Nile River, hoping someone would find him and raise him. God so worked that her baby was found by Pharaoh's daughter. She even became her own son's nurse. God used Moses mightily, to free the Hebrew people from their 400 year, bondage of slavery and take them to the Promised Land. Although little is written about Jochebed in the Bible, her story speaks powerfully to mothers of today.

Bathsheba – "she was the object of King David's lust. She was a wife to Uriah the Hittite, so David had him killed so he could have her. God was very displeased about this and struck dead the baby from that union. In spite of this, Bathsheba remained loyal to David. Their next son, Solomon, was loved by God and grew up to become Israel's greatest king. From David's line would come to Jesus Christ, the Savior of the World. And Bathsheba would have the distinguished honor of being one of only five women listed in 'Messiah's ancestry'."

I never thought about these ancient-time mothers the same as today's mothers, but I now realize that mothers, past and present, are the same. While some struggle with parenting; most love, protect and nurture their children. Fortunately, God is always here to give us guidance and a helping hand.
